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South African Connection

Recently I was surprised by a package I received from South Africa. I do not know anyone in South Africa but I opened the package with great anticipation. Inside was a letter from *Dr. Angela Gilhespie*

of Glenvista South Africa along with a beautiful Baobab Tree woven from the leaves of banana trees (see photo, to the right). She thought it was an appropriate gift, given our Society's Logo.

It seems that Dr. Gilhespie was surfing the web when she came across our award winning AAGSNC web site, built and maintained by Jim Neal, AAGSNC Web master. She looked at some of the past issues of the AAGSNC Newsletter and decided to send the tree along with some information about an organization of Black African Artists with whom she works.

According to Dr. Gilhespie, "The art has an interesting 'evolution'. The artists are located in many rural areas: in remote regions of Malawi, [the] Congo, Zimbabwe, and so on. They work where the raw materials are available e.g. soapstone and verdite in Zimbabwe, malachite in the Congo, ebony in Malawi, grasses in Natal, and so on. From there the finishing is carried out where the works are displayed for sale. One such a collection is some 100 km NW of Johannesburg. This is on the main road from Sun City to Johannesburg where tourists often stop. The instability throughout central and southern Africa has resulted in a significant drop in tourism. Crime around Johannesburg has led to the perception that this area is not a suitable destination; [tourist would] rather stay within the confines of Cape Town and the Kruger Park. This is such a pity because it is an area rich in culture and history.

She writes "Local artists here battle for survival. They often live by the side of the road from which they sell. They don't have the infrastructure to access markets where their crafts would be appreciated. Tourism is minimal; crime certainly sees to that. Many of their crafted pieces are incredibly beautiful and would be very sought-after in the first- world markets. Money earned from their sale could be fed back t their communities. This provides work which keeps these crafts "alive".

Dr. Gilhespie invites AAGSNC members to participate in a 'Cradle of Man' tour that her group is promoting in an attempt to attract African Americans and other tourists to some of the less traveled areas of Black South Africa such as the area of the Sterkfontein Caves (near where ex-South African President Nelson Mandela was incarcerated) which have yielded some of the most remarkable fossils on the origins of man.

> Dr. Gilhespie also enclosed a circular advertising the various crafts made by this group of "starving" artists. The purpose of Dr. Gilhespie's communiqué was to see if there was any interest from the AAGSNC membership in purchasing some of the Baobab trees since it is the symbol of our organization. More importantly, however, she is seeking our assistance in contact-

ing a larger community of those who would wish to support their cause through purchasing the art objects produced by the group.

The inset (to the right) contains photographs of other articles available from this group of artists.

The photograph (below) is of the Artists market area between Sun City and Johannesburg in South Africa. AAGSNC is in the process of developing a relationship with the artists group in South Africa and plans to engage in the sale of some of these art object as a means of fund raising. In the meantime AAGSNC has secured a small supply of Baobab Trees which we hope to be able to begin selling by the time the September 16, 2000 membership meeting is convened. <u>Shirley Evans</u> – One of the lacking activities that surfaced during one of our business meetings was the lack of a focal point for archival data and other information generated from various AAGSNC research activities. That is, where and how do we store and retrieve research products. Shirley as the Society's <u>Archivist/Historian</u> is responsible for the facilitation of this endeavor. The hope is that she will able to work on some strategies and resources in conjunction with our Lifetime Membership group.

<u>Kashan Robinson</u> – <u>Membership Director</u>. One of the most strategic functions has to do with membership services. Kashan graciously took over this responsibility from Carol Neal. The duties involve a host of activities including membership recruitment.

Lisa Lee – As the new <u>Program Director</u>, Lisa has the charge of "priming the event pump". She inherits the larger portion of responsibilities previously handled by Electra. Electra will still play a facilitating role for larger scale events.

Slave Information

The largest collection of slave information ever collected is available on CD-ROM. Gwendolyn Midlo Hall through her database, "Databases for the Study of Afro-Louisiana History and Genealogy, 1699-1860: Computerized Information from Original Manuscript Sources" has computerized the records of more than 100,000 slaves. Historians and genealogist are amazed at the breadth and width of the documentation about slaves. It appears that French and Spanish Louisiana slave owners were better record keepers than British proprietors on

GOING HOME

Recently we received several e-mail messages from a Canadian television production company. They are interested in documenting the quest of a descendent of an African slave in tracing his/her ancestry back to Africa. They are primarily interested in Canadian families, but have shown some interest in Americans whose family history reached into Canada. Here is the text of the original e-mail from the researcher:

"I am working as a researcher for a Canadian company called Great North Productions. We a researching for a series called "Going Home", I would like to do a story on the slave trade. I think watching a person go back to the homelands of their relatives who were displaced by the slave trade would have great impact on Canadian viewers. The series will be seen on two channels, The Life Network, and the History Channel. The History Channel wants a story with a historical spin, and the Life Network wants a dramatic story. We want to incorporate both of these elements.

Going Home Series Overview

Going Home is a weekly, half-hour television series that will follow Canadian families or individuals, the famous and not-sofamous, as they return to the country of their family's originssometimes for the first time in their lives, sometimes for the first time in generations, and sometimes, to renew friendships with close friends and relatives. Going Home will present to a national audience the varied multi-cultural facets of our country and help Canadians understand where many of us came from-and, as importantly, why we came. Combining travel, history and cultural exploration, Going Home promises to be unique, informative, entertaining and participatory. The series will be unpretentious and unpredictable. In true cinema viewers style, we will never know in advance what awaits our travelers. Viewers watching Going Home will come to expect the unexpected.

Genealogy has become almost a sacred mission for tens of thousands of Canadians, and millions of people worldwide. Canada's Centennial in 1967 and Alex Haley's 1976 book Roots, fuelled earlier explosions in searching out family trees. This latest phenomenon springs from the Internet. With only minimal coaching, people are flocking to related web sites (there are over two million-and counting) to transport themselves back in time. When the Mormons set up their free Internet site in May 1999, it received a staggering 30 million electronic hits in its first day of operation.

Surprisingly, the most dedicated questions, according to a survey for American Demographics magazine, are 35 to 44 years old, a group whose nomadic days are over and who are often raising kids. They show a strong desire to reconnect to their roots-to fill in the gaps.

The families or individuals who trace their heritage in episodes of Going Home will be selected by means of electronic and print research. A small production committee might screen short home videos submitted by interested parties in which they explain why they want to return to their ancestral homeland. These videotapes could become part of the opening sequence of each episode, and would enable the producers to ensure that the subjects of each episode are comfortable before the cameras and have engaging personalities.

Once the successful applicants have been selected, our documentary crew will film them in Canada as they prepare for their trip and we will find out what they expect to learn from their journey. We will then follow them to their destination and document their experiences. We will come to learn something about the land and the culture they left, find out why they (or their forefathers) emigrated to Canada, and learn whether or not they now think this was a wise decision. In some cases, we may arrange for our travelers to be met by a local expert genealogist and/or historian who will have been selected, as is done on the successful Antique Road Show series, for their expertise in specific regions and time periods, and for their on-camera presence and personality. The expert will then accompany the visitor back to the region of his or her ancestry; explore both the history and the contemporary reality of the area and attempt to make a connection with the visitor's ancestral roots.

Each half-hour episode of Going Home will consist of one major documentary segment in which we follow one fa mily or individual back to the country of their ancestry. This would be the centerpiece of each program. It could be packaged with the video audition tapes and with interviews with the subjects after they have returned from their trip. A studio host would conduct these interviews, someone well recognized as an historian of note and with a comfortable on-camera presence.

Great North Productions would like to pay for an individual to take a trip to their homelands. I'd like is contact names and phone numbers of Canadians that would like to take a trip to their homeland. Please reply if you have any leads or people that we can follow up with. I am more than happy to send information on Going Home and Great North Productions. This is a real offer!!!! If you want to go back to your home land and you have a story to tell, or for more information feel free to contact me.
